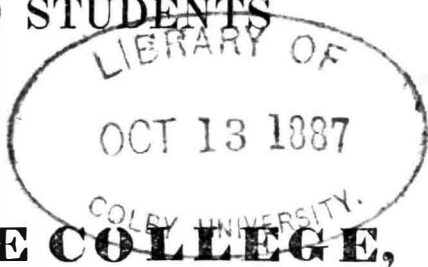

Tuition and room rent twenty dollars per year. Board one dollar and seventeen cents per week. Wood is from one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents per cord.

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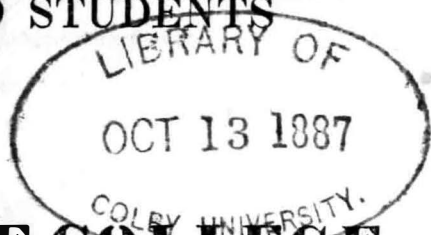

Course of Studies.

Candidates for admission to the Freshman Class must exhibit testimonials of good moral character. They are examined in English, Latin, and Greek Grammar, Caesar's Commentaries or Sallust, Virgil, Cicero's Select Orationes, and Latin Prosody; the four Evangelists in Greek, Jacob's Greek Reader, Ancient and Modern Geography, Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, and the Doctrine of Roots and Powers.

Students preparing for College are advised, though not required, to study Blair's Rhetoric, abridged, and to obtain such a knowledge of Algebra as will enable them to solve Equations of the 2d Degree.

Candidates for advanced standing are examined in the preparatory studies, and in the various branches to which the classes they propose to enter have attended. Those who are admitted from other Colleges must present certificates of honourable dismissal. In all cases testimonials of good moral character are required.

FRESHMAN YEAR.

1st TERM.—Algebra.* Xenoph. Hist. Graec. Terent. Comoed. Tacit. Germ. & Vit. Agric. Greek and Lat. Prosody.

2d TERM.—Algebra continued. Plane Geometry.—Horatii Opera. Lat. Prosody and Versification.—French. Platonis Meno & Crito; Alcibiades uterque.



SOPHOMORE YEAR.

1st TERM.—Solid Geometry. Socratis Memorabilia. Juvenalis Satirae. Cic. Tuscul. Quaest.

* The Cambridge Course of Mathematics is used throughout.

2d TERM.—Trig. Plane and Spher. Application of Algebra to Geometry, including Conic Sections. Blair's Lectures. German Language. Cic. de Officiis & de Natura Deorum.



JUNIOR YEAR.

1st TERM.—Topography. Kaime's Elements. Paley's Moral Philosophy. Logic.

2d TERM.—Calculus. Cambridge Mechanics begun. Chemistry. Euripidis Phoenissae. Paley's Natural Theology. Intellectual Philosophy.



SENIOR YEAR.

1st TERM.—Mechanics finished. Platonis Phaedon. Paley's Evidences.

2d TERM.—Optics, Electricity, Magnetism and Cambridge Astronomy. Hebrew, or Vattell's Law of Nations. Campbell's Philosophy of Rhetoric. Demosthenes, Aeschines, and Lysias.

Throughout the course
There are frequent exercises in Composition and Declamation, and Lectures on various branches of Study.

Commencement is on the last Wednesday in July.

The College Year embraces two terms, and two Vacations. The first Vacation is of four weeks, from Commencement; the second, of nine weeks, from the last Wednesday in November.

At the close of each Term there is a public Examination of the several classes, which is continued from four to six days. The Examination in July is attended by a Committee appointed by the Board of Trustees.

There is an annual Exhibition in May for the Junior and Sophomore Classes.

The advantages secured to the Steward on the extensive farm belonging to the College and the low price of provisions, Fuel, &c. in this vicinity, have induced the Prudential Committee to direct, that the price of board in Commons shall not exceed one dollar per week. The following statement of annual expenses, the average of three years, is made by Students now in College, from their private account books. They assure the Faculty, that some respectable Students expend less; and that, excepting books and furniture, (which may both be hired for from eight to ten dollars a year,) it includes all the expenses necessarily incurred by a Student in College.

A Mechanic's Shop has been erected in which the Students may obtain suitable exercise at all seasons of the year, and defray, in part, the expenses of their Education. It will probably be opened at the commencement of the Spring Term.

The Philosophical Apparatus was principally procured in London, by a distinguished Nat. Philosopher, at an expense of \$1500,00. A good Chemical Apparatus has also been obtained. The Students have access to Libraries containing above 2000 Volumes.

The Academy, completed during the past year, is under the direction of a Committee appointed by the Trus-

tees of the College. It contains between forty and fifty pupils. The Preceptor is a gentleman of high Literary and Scientific attainments. Good board, washing, lodging, fuel, and lights, can be obtained in private families for from seven to nine shillings per week.

Medical School.

Lectures will commence on the first Thursday of March next, at Woodstock, Vt. At the close of the Term, which is of thirteen weeks, degrees are conferred by the authority of Waterville College.

Fees for the course, \$40.

Examination fee, 12.

Matriculation fee, 5.

No matriculation fee will be required of those who pay whole fees.

Prerequisites for examination are, three years study with a regular physician, an attendance on at least two courses of Lectures, one of which must have been at this school, and a competent knowledge of the Latin Language. Candidates must be not less than twenty-one years of age, and must sustain a fair moral character.

Those who have attended two courses previously, may attend a third course at this school, by paying examination and matriculation fees.

The Reading Term commences one week after the close of the Lecture Term and continues through the year. Fees, \$30.

Strict attention is bestowed on Students, in Examinations, recitations, compositions, &c. with demonstrative anatomy.

The examinations for degrees are attended by four Censors, appointed, two by the Vermont Medical Society, and two by the Board of Trustees of the College.
